Several years ago, I shared "good news": High Point was going to be renovated/rebuilt beginning in 2017-2018. My dreams for our community have been shattered! I watched as the school board moved the start date back a year at a time. In June of this year, we were told 2024. The start date has now been moved back to 2025! Some have said to me "Karen it's just one more year." My response is it is not one more year; it is eight more years, eight years too many! High Point High School is 63 years old. High Point High School will be 70 in 2024. High Point High School is currently at 127% capacity. In 2024 High Point will be at 154% capacity.

High Point has a current enrollment of around 3,000 students, up 900 students since 2014. As I stated, High Point is the oldest high school that has not been renovated or rebuilt. How can our students be trained for the future in a school that was built in 1954? The school cannot even begin to

from Ranger Sweet and representatives of the troop, and the National Capital Area Council Patuxent District, Kyle began the first phase of the project, which was conducted during the Labor Day holiday weekend. Lumber and other materials were acquired with the aid of a local contractor, then transported to Kyle's home. A team of older Boy Scouts joined Kyle at his home to construct the six identical benches according to his project plan. Guidance and assistance with power tools were provided by Assistant Scoutmaster Eric Saathoff and Kyle's Uncle

Kevin and Aunt Jane Thomas.

Next came marking the installation site at the community center so that Miss Utility could identify any potential hazards prior to the proposed installation of the benches. Upon notification of clearance to dig at the site, September 30th was determined to be the installation date in consultation with MNCPPC. On this date, a group of Cub Scouts worked to clear the site and assemble the fire ring. Meanwhile, various adult Boy and Cub Scout leaders and parents operated the gas-powered auger provided by MNCPPC to dig the 18 post holes needed to mount the six benches securely.

Boy Scouts completed digging the holes using shovels and digging bars, then placed the benches in the ground making sure each was properly spaced and leveled.

In addition to the wonderful volunteers from the troop and pack, Kyle gratefully acknowledges the support of the College Park Home Depot and Zimmerman's Ace Hardware for providing materials at a reduced cost. Raulin's Bakery also donated assorted pastries for a morning

Now that the campfire area has been renovated, the troop and pack are looking forward to many crossover ceremonies occurring there for years to come. Groups wishing to use the area for events should contact the Beltsville Community Center.

## Local Author is Creating New Worlds in His Latest Novel

David Taylor: you may not know the name yet, but you may someday. Mr. Taylor is a local author who has written ten novels, of which three have been published. He is putting the finishing touches on novel number eleven. His latest book is the middle story of his science fiction trilogy A Tale of Four Planets and is titled The Rejected Counsel of Oomb. Sessions with the Seer is the title of the first novel of the trilogy, and you can find both titles on Amazon.

Mr. Taylor is a local resident who grew up not far from Beltsville in the Wheaton/Silver Spring area and has lived in Beltsville for the last fourteen years. He received his undergraduate degree in English literature and his Master's Degree in Cross-Cultural Education at Ohio University. It was here that he met his wife. After college, Taylor and his wife traveled to Puerto Rico where he taught remedial English at Catholic University in Ponce Puerto Rico for two years. His wife is from Puerto Rico, and it is a place that is special for both of them. They have been very affected by the recent devastation of Hurricane Maria, and because of this, all royalties from the A Tale of Four Planets trilogy is being donated to relief efforts through the end of 2018. Taylor followed up his time in Puerto Rico by spending a year helping the Berlitz School with an experimental program to teach English to police officers and firefighters from Saudi Arabia and Kuwait and a couple of years teaching English and speech communication at Prince George's Community College. He then taught English as a second language for Montgomery County Public Schools for 28 years.

According to Mr. Taylor, writing has always been a passion. In his words, "I have felt a commitment or calling to storytelling since before I can remember; my mom claimed that, when I was only two years old, I would insist on sitting her down to spin some yarns for her!" Much of his early writing imitated authors and stories he loved. He is a huge fan of Jules Verne, comic books, and

television shows such as Star Trek and The Man from U.N.C.L.E. When he was a teenager, he wrote novels based on these television shows and even sent one of his stories for U.N.C.L.E to the show's executive producer, Norman Felton. Mr. Taylor said, "it was a big thrill to receive an encouraging letter from him!" College was the time that Mr. Taylor began exploring the creation of entirely original

Mr. Taylor has done a lot for children in his years as an educator and a writer. His work with children "inspired the creation of some picture books to help them learn English. They featured such characters as Boo-Boo Banana, Happy Apple, Poo-Poo Potato, and King Carrot. My favorite of those was Superbanana, a ninetypage picture book epic! Superbanana could leap over a tall flower in a single bound, run faster than a speeding bug, and bend a blade of grass with his bare hands. But his real superpower was bringing out the best in other people!"

When talking about his novels, Mr. Taylor highlighted Contact with Gaia, a book he wrote and published in 2003, as having a special place in his heart. According to him, "It was heavily inspired by my work with children from all over the world and was the first novel I was able to get published in its entirety." When asked about his favorite, he replied: "the trilogy I am completing, A Tale of Four Planets, is my hands down favorite because I believe it is, by far, my best-written, most consequential work."

We began this piece discussing Mr. Taylor's most recent novel, and I asked him to tell me a little about it and the trilogy itself. The Rejected Counsel of Oomb is the second book in the trilogy. Both novels deal with the first contact with an alien race. The main human characters are a Puerto Rican Family from Philadelphia. On the website goodreads, reviewer Elizabeth Brown said that the first book, Sessions with the Seer, was "one of the most original and well-crafted novels I've read in a long time! I was completely drawn in from the get-go." You can check out both novels in the series on Amazon now.



## Tech Sense By John Bell

This month, we continue our discussion of telephones. We ended last month discussing how Internet phone companies provide the bridge between Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) and the public switched telephone network (PSTN). Internet phones often use the Session Initiation Protocol (SIP) to make telephone connections between Internet phones. An Internet phone can be a dedicated VoIP device, or it can be an application that runs on your computer, mobile phone, or tablet. It requires a microphone and speakers to use your computer. These applications are often called "softphones" because they are implemented in software. Most modern Android phones include a built-in softphone that can be enabled through the setup application. Search the setup app for "Wi-Fi calling." As we discussed last month, an oldfashioned phone device is usable

with an analog telephone adapter (ATA).

## **Google Voice**

Last month, we discussed VoIP providers and incoming phone numbers, or DID's. If you are going through most VoIP providers, there is a fee for the DID and for the service to connect to the PSTN. Google has offered a service for many years now known as Google Voice. Google Voice gives you an incoming phone number for free to use with its service, which is also free. You can port your existing phone number over for a small fee (about \$20). Google Voice provides a number of phone services including voicemail, call forwarding, and a feature that rings all of the phones that you list with them. Google Voice can also block spam phone calls. The voice mail messages left on Google Voice can be picked up on your mobile phone or computer, so you never have to miss another answering machine message. Phone calls in the USA are free, and international calls are very inexpensive (about 2 cents per minute to Europe, for example).

## **PBX**

A private branch exchange, or PBX, is used for businesses where they need multiple internal phone lines that can interconnect. A PBX allows phones to be used for interoffice calling and outside calling and allows many phones to share a small number of outgoing lines. Not too long ago, it was common for a PBX to be implemented as specialized hardware that was installed into each business location. Today, this can be done with software on a personal computer, or even a small \$30 computer

like the Raspberry Pi. Asterisk is a popular free and open source program that provides full PBX functionality and runs on many computers including the Pi. The latest trend is to host the PBX in the cloud. There is no longer a need to install any hardware in the office other than the VoIP phones or ATA. The PBX can span offices that are located far apart in different cities, states, and even countries.

## **SIP to SIP Calling**

If you already have Internet, you can make free phone calls using VoIP and SIP without ever connecting to the PSTN. Most softphones support this feature and will accept incoming calls directly from other SIP-based VoIP phones. Because there is no PSTN connection involved, these Internet phone calls are free anyplace in the world.




## **Skype and Other Ways** to Talk

Of course, there are alternatives. Most people have heard of or used Skype, which is now owned by Microsoft. Skype allows both voice and video chat, and the business version now supports SIP and supports some VoIP phones. Skype users can talk to any other Skype user in the world free. Skype can also bridge to the regular PSTN to make ordinary phones call for a small per-minute fee that varies from country to country. The Skype app is available on most computers and modern mobile phones. Google provides Hangouts, which, like Skype, works on most computers and mobile phones and allows calling landlines for a small fee.

As an alternative to Skype,

## **Health insurance** deadline: December 15

Now through December 15 is the time to learn about coverage—and other ways to save money on health insur-

## **New Law Allowing FREE Credit Freeze**

Earlier this year, the Maryland legislature was ahead of the curve by passing a new law that provides consumers the right to place a freeze on their credit reports free of charge. The recent Equifax data breach is a clear example of why consumers should use every available resource to help keep their personal information out of the hands of identity thieves. The new law only waives the fees for

freezing a credit report, but not the fees for temporarily "thawing" or lifting the freeze on a credit report if the consumer needs to apply for credit, rent an apartment, or engage in another transaction in which the credit report needs to be reviewed. The fee for temporarily thawing a credit report is \$5 for each credit bureau, but creditors only need to review one bureau's report. Details for placing a security freeze are online at

## Two miles of Route 1 resurfacing

The Maryland State Highway Administration is beginning a safety and resurfacing project on Route 1 between MD 200 (ICC) and Cherry Lane in Laurel. The \$3.3 million project should be completed by the end of the year. Improvements will be made to driving lanes, curbs, gutters and sidewalk drainage pipes, bike lanes, and traffic signals. Drivers can expect single lane closures Mondays through Fridays between 9 am and 3 pm and two lanes Sunday nights through Friday mornings between 9 pm and 5 am. Approximately 39,000 vehicles travel this section of Route 1 daily, so please allow extra travel time during construction.

## The YOO Club Has Commenced!





in Celtic folklore.

"The Celts can be traced back to 800 B.C. to what is now southern Germany and include the ancestors of the Scottish, Irish, Manx, Welsh, Cornish and Bretons. Particular motifs of modernday Halloween such as the date and time it is celebrated, children trick-or-treating, the jack-o-lantern and bobbing for apples are related to Celtic traditions."

When Christianity was introduced to the Celts, church leaders tried to persuade them to abandon their pagan celebrations and adopt the Christian calendar. Because these traditions were culturally ingrained, the church

provided alternative holy days such as All Saints' Day on Nov. 1.

"The evening before All Saints' Day became 'All Hallows' Day,' then 'Hallow's Eve,' with the word 'hallow' meaning holy or saint and 'eve' meaning the night before," Suppe says. "Hallow's Eve evolved to Halloween."

Another origin for trick-ortreating comes from Scotland, where young men in their late teens donned disguises after the

"The Celts called them 'guisers,' which is where we get the word 'geezer,'" he said, "The guisers would march around a house and demand hospitality, which evolved into small children asking for treats."





## Baker Bill@Riderwood

Yes, I write about Riderwood a lot. That's because I'm impressed. It's not a nursing home but a place to retire to. I lost a leg about four years ago, and here I am not housebound. I work in the church and other programs, I go to the supermarket by a bus that can load me in my chair, and all my medical needs are here. Also, my children do not need to worry that I'll move in with them and be a burden.

Last month, I wrote about the easiest pie ever: pour liquid into a shell from the store and walk away for an hour. Cutout Christmas Cookies are this month's recipe. Everyone thinks they have the best recipe for them, but mine is better. So if you been thinking about a new one, here it is.

Before we begin, I want to tell you about butter. We buy butter from the store, and it is yellowish. Butter is supposed to be pale white, white as printer paper; it turns yellow with age. Age also gives it more flavor. I once worked in the field of croissants. In New York, there is a company that made the best-tasting croissants of any in NY. Its secret was it never used butter that wasn't at least one year old and bright yellow. So my tip for you is to purchase your butter now for the holidays and then just put it in the vegetable bin and forget it. If you find butter on sale, it will be yellow. Great. Ok, here we go.

## **Cutout Christmas Cookies**

In a medium bowl, place 2/3 cup of sugar.

Add one stick of butter.

Cream the mixture well with a hand mixer.

Stir in one egg.

Add flavor: I like almond, but rum or vanilla is also good.

Add 1 cup flour (any you have).

Stir until it is a stiff mass.

In class, we would roll it out on a flowered tea towel, very thin, about a 1/4 inch.

Use cookie cutters to cut out the shapes.

Spritz the dough with water to make the colored sugar stick. Add the colored sugar.

Bake them until the edges are slightly brown, about 10 minutes at 350 degrees.



Apple offers the FaceTime app, and Google offers both Hangouts and the Duo app. While these are intended as Skype alternatives, neither FaceTime nor Duo can connect to regular landline phones or support SIP and other VoIP protocols. Therefore, FaceTime and Duo are not phone applications; instead, we call these video chat applications. Both Skype and Hangouts can interact with VoIP and PSTN phones and behave as true phone applications.

Also, FaceTime is only available for Apple phones and devices and only allows video chatting with other Apple devices running FaceTime. Sorry if you want to call someone with an Android phone. Google's Duo is similar to FaceTime, designed to support secure, high definition (HD) video chat over low bandwidth networks. Like FaceTime, Duo can only talk to other phones with Duo and cannot connect to regular phones lines. Unlike FaceTime, Duo is available on both Android phones and iPhones.




