# Cub Scout Pack 1031 Is Exploring Our World





# Veterans Education Challenge

Attending college seems likes the natural next step for most high school seniors upon graduation. For those who have just recently separated from the military, financial and family constraints may make going to college a more difficult decision. The majority of veterans on college campuses are considered "non-traditional students" in that they did not go to college directly after high school. This means that they are older than the general college population, with forty-seven percent having a spouse and/or children. Sure the GI Bill and Pell Grants pay for a lot of the expenses, but they do they do not pay for all of them. To bridge this burdensome financial gap for our ex-service members, two scholarship funds were established this past Veteran's Day as a way of assisting our brave veterans as they embark on the next

phase of their lives outside of the military. One fund is the \$1 million dollar Veteran's Scholarship Fund at The University of Maryland. The goal of this fund is to help eliminate the \$6000 debt load that many UMD veterans incur. The other fund, the Veterans Education Challenge depends on public support to be successful. With this fund, a generous donor will match every dollar up to \$1 million donated by the general public, with 100% of the money going towards veteran scholarships at select colleges outside of Maryland. #### **Gifts of Games**

Believe it or not, games are one of the largest segments of software sales, and with the giving season coming, I thought games might be a good technology topic. The traditional way of purchasing games has been to buy CDs, DVDs, floppy disks, cartridges, or other media that are used to install the software on your computer. In recent years, the trends have changed, and new games are purchased and downloaded over the Internet.

#### **Steam**

Valve, a maker of computer games, realized it had a problem distributing patches to its games that were sold through the traditional channels. Valve decided to solve to this problem by creating a system to send out patches or entire games. This platform also provided a form of Digital Rights Management (DRM) that allows the user more freedom in installing games for play on multiple computers.

Eventually, this solution became known as Steam and is now the largest online distributor of games. Steam has several thousand games available in its catalog. When a purchase is made, the game is downloaded using the Steam application and installed onto the computer. The Steam application allows the game to be installed on multiple computers but enforces the rule that only one person may be playing the game at a time. The authorization to launch a game is web based, but Steam allows most games to be played even when disconnected from the web as well. Steam almost always has a number of games on sale and several times each year Steam has very large sales with significant savings on even the most popular games. Steam also has provision for purchasing games to give to others as gifts. You can access Steam with your browser at the URL http://steampowered.com.

#### **Good Old Games (GOG)**

OK, so you had this favorite great old game on Windows 98 or even DOS, and it doesn't run on new Windows. Good Old Games, better known as GOG, comes to the rescue. It offers a number of older titles that have been updated

#### **Others**

There are other game sites of note as well. Origin (http://www. origin.com) is a good source for games created by origin and Electronics Arts (EA). These include The Sims, Sim City, the Command and Conquer series, and Spore. These games typically employ a web-based, DRM strategy and require a web connection to play. #### Beltsville Agricultural Research Center Named National Historic Chemical Landmark for the Discovery of Phytochrome

**By Jim Butcher** 

Why do plants start growing in spring? Why do some seeds germinate at the barest glimpse of light, and then become sturdy and green as they poke through the soil. How do plants sense their neighbors, and how do sun-loving plants know to overtop their neighbors? How do plants of the same species bloom at the same time every year, and why do some bloom early (tomatoes) or later (chrysanthemums) in the growing

season? What makes the regularity of plant growth and development so predictable year-afteryear? How is it all possible?

"The explanation came as one of the 20th century's greatest plant science discoveries," said Dr. Dariusz Swietlik, Area Director, North East Area, Agricultural Research Service (ARS), in opening remarks at the October 21, ceremony to honor the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center as an American Chemical Society National Historic Chemical Landmark for the discovery or phytochrome.

Unable to better their locations, Swietlik said, plants monitor light quality second by second and adjust their development accordingly to changing conditions. The substance that allows plants to do so is a bright, blue colored pigment. Once ridiculed by skeptics as a "pigment of the imagination," the pigment now is recognized world-wide by the scientifically



These blankets are provided free of charge to the patient as a symbol of strength and encouragement and as a reminder that they are not in this fight alone.

Each blanket is as unique as the person who receives it. Once the blankets are completed, a custom tag is sewn on each blanket, and the blanket is packaged for delivery. The designated hospital representative presents each breast cancer patient with their blanket before or directly after surgery.

HRUS Director Michelle Anderson's mother was the recipient of one of these special blankets in February 2010. Anderson said,"This is a cause that is very dear to my heart. My mother, god-mother, and a family friend of over 30 years are breast cancer survivors. It starts off as just a day to wear a pretty color, but many of my students have begun asking the question, 'What does the pink mean?' 

the role of economic power in creating the concept of "race," examples of modern-day institutional racism, the importance of eliminating stereotypes, and future goals for 21st century American society. Following their presentation, the panelists took questions from attendees.

Joyce Turner, a resident of Riderwood, is the co-chair of the Diversity and Inclusion Committee. "We are very proud of not only the substantive quality of the first event but also the high turnout and engaged audience," said Ms. Turner. "This series enhances the signature programs created by our committee."

She noted that future panels in 2016 will highlight Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., women who have broken historical and professional barriers, and those who cope with physical barriers in their daily lives.

correct name phytochrome. "The discovery and isolation of phytochrome were the result of a more than 40-years of cross-disciplinary collaboration by researchers at the U.S. Department of Agriculture".

"The discovery opened the way to many valuable leaps forward for agricultural science, such as growing crops in new seasons even creating new ways to protect plants from pests," said Agricultural Research Service (ARS) Administrator Chavonda Jacobs-Young at the award ceremony. For example, knowledge of phytochrome, and related photoperiodism, enabled soybean varieties to be bred to mature at staggered dates, boosting the value and importance of soybeans as a crop.

Awareness of phytochrome also brought the discovery that exposing chrysanthemums to light for just minutes in the middle of night prevents flowering. This allowed growers to time blooming, and turned mums into one of the country's most valuable ornamentals with U.S. sales of more than \$135 million a year.

The ceremony to mark the national landmark honor was followed by a symposium hosted by BARC on past, present and future research related to phytochrome. The keynote speaker was Peter H. Quail, professor, Department of Plant and Microbial Biology, University of California, Berkeley and research director of the Plant Gene Expression Center, Albany, California. His talk was titled A Pigment of the Imagination. Also speaking was Karl Norris, a member of the original ARS phytochrome discovery team and the developer of near-infrared reflectance spectroscopy, which can quantify the chemical composition of substances using certain light wavelengths.


