

Thomas Steeley Talks Taxes at the Greater Beltsville Business Association

Washington gridlock, the looming sequester, federal budget deficits, changes in Social Security taxes, ObamaCare's impact on taxpayers, all of these issues are the backdrop in any discussion on taxes for businesses large and small. It is no wonder businesses must carefully and strategically plan each financial decision in this shifting landscape.

That was the opening message by the GBBA's Feb. 20 Speaker, Thomas Steeley, managing director of Steeley & Associates, tax experts and financial advisors with an office in Laurel.

Mr. Steeley went into some detail on new tax rates and laws that business owners need to keep in mind as they plan and structure their finances. He offered specific and concrete examples to make his points and schooled GBBA members on strategies to lower their tax liability.

He concluded his presentation with a rundown of these, "Top 6 Tax Mistakes for Business Owners," and possible alternative steps

to avert those mistakes.

- 1. Poor record keeping and bookkeeping, which includes maintaining bank accounts/credit cards used exclusively for the business. He recommends do it right, or hire a professional.
- 2. Too conservative on taking legal, legitimate and well-documented deductions. Don't rule out
- a deduction just because there are preconceived notions that it is a "red flag" and you will be audited. Too often businesses get bad advice, are overly concerned, and rule out legitimate deductions.
- 3. Wrong form of business organization in light of changes in current laws. Restructuring as an S Corporation might be a better option under current law.
- 4. Poor retirement planning; no retirement planning. Be sure to have a plan and carefully consider

staffing alternatives. Re-frame compensation in light of recent changes.

- 5. Poor planning. Time major moves, sale of property or business with capital gains, revenues and expenses in mind.
- 6. Improper investment allocation or tax diversification; Make decisions based on current trends in the markets, the economic environment, to minimize risks.

Department of Social Services Extension Office Now Open in Beltsville

In Sept., Prince George's County opened an extension office of the Department of Social Services in Beltsville with shorter lines and more personalized service. This branch office is located at the Beltsville Seventh-day Adventist Church at 4200 Ammendale Road, Beltsville, Md. and is in the Beltsville Adventist Community Center (BACC) in the building directly behind the church. The office is open on Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 9 a.m. to 12 noon. At this branch office, a limited range of services is available. These services include emergency cash assistance, temporary cash

assistance for adults without children, food stamps, and medical assistance.

BACC itself offers additional services to the Beltsville community, which include: volunteer financial crisis counselors who assist with job searches, résumé development, budgeting, and sorting of financial priorities; free computer usage for applying for jobs, applying for DSS services through SAIL, checking email, and computer education. A food pantry for qualifying Beltsville residents who are in crisis; and the Financial Peace University semi-

"The Center has now been open since Sept. and many people have improved their résumés, found better-paying jobs, and found help with financial priorities and budgeting," said Pastor Glenn Holland, Director of BACC. "Sometimes our Center provides financial assistance for people who may not qualify for some reason for state or county assistance. Our goal at BACC is to help people for the long term so they are not dependent on external assistance."

Hams historically have helped with communications during such events as the United States invasion of Granada, the September 11 terrorist attacks on New York's World Trade Center towers, and the Johnstown flood in 1936.

There is the Amateur Radio Emergency Service, with local emergency coordinators and members who have registered "for communications duty in the public service when disaster strikes.'



Perhaps the record should show that Mr. Hoyer invites local, state, and national media to these events. That statement goes a long way toward explaining how a recent Friday lunchtime found an alleged reporter from the Beltsville News breaking luncheon bread not only with the distinguished Congressman and staff, but also with reporters from such notable news organizations as the Washington Post, the Baltimore Sun, the Federal Times, and more.

Mr. Hover kicked off this year's press luncheon with brief comments on prominent issues of the day and then opened the meeting for questions and answers. Topics ranged from national to local and then back again. The next paragraphs offer takings from comments and expressed views as captured in a reporter's notebook.

On sequestration and the budget:

Mr. Hoyer believes sequestration may happen this year. What is sequestration, by the way? One simplified characterization puts sequestration as triggering automatic, across-the-board federal spending cuts in the face of federal budget deficits. One big hurdle standing in the way of budget passage, says Hoyer, is the two major parties' inability to agree on deals that will hold. Maryland stands to lose a whopping \$1 billion dollars of federal funding if sequestration happens this year.

The President's budget for fiscal year 2014 would normally arrive on Capitol Hill about mid-February. This year will be a little more complicated, though, because Congressman Paul Ryan plans to submit a budget, too. The Ryan budget would come out in March and would contain a plan to close the budget deficit in 10 years. Hoyer is not convinced that 10-year goal is doable.

On the economy:

Federal spending is running at 23 percent of Gross Domestic Product, but revenue income is only 15 percent of GDP. Some agreement is necessary to improve on the revenue side of the equation, Mr. Hoyer maintains.

Mr. Hoyer spearheads the Democrats' initiative on "Make It In America," which focuses on rebuilding American manufacturing and bringing more well paying jobs to the American homeland. Much more on the initiative and many other issues can be found on Mr. Hoyer's web page, http://www.democraticwhip.gov/. For that inner policy junkie that may lurk within you, yearning to breathe free, you can even sign up on-the-spot for daily or weekly email updates and RSS feeds brought directly to your computer.

The words "Democratic Whip" display in the web page address and on Mr. Hoyer's business card.

Those words signal that our congressman is among the most powerful political figures in Washington. The House whip is the second highest-ranking individual in his party, outranked only by the minority leader. That's a big deal. Dictionary.com describes the functions of a political whip this way: a party manager in a legislative body who secures attendance for voting and directs other mem-

Senator Hagel would make a fine Secretary of Defense. He is well equipped to manage the Pentagon in the current economic

On House Speaker John Boehner:

The speaker wants the country to work. But he is finding it hard to keep fellow Republicans onboard once cross-party deals have been made.

On the proposed FBI headquarters move

Prince George's County is a strong competitor for this federal plum. Some Virginia jurisdictions are in the running, too, as is Montgomery County, Maryland. One strong point that Prince George's has going for it is available open land. The FBI wants its headquarters surrounded by a measure of open space separating the headquarters from nearby traffic. Perhaps more than any other proposed location, Prince George's County can supply the open land.

On federal employees:

Mr. Hoyer has long championed the federal workforce. He regrets that only federal employees — other than folks making over \$400,000 annually - have been asked to contribute to deficit reduction. He says 40 percent of current federal employees will be eligible to retire within the next 5 years. He supports retaining retiree job vacancies as they happen and filling vacancies with the best available replacements.

On Immigration Reform:

Though no one put the issue quite into these words, a reporter might infer from Mr. Hoyer's remarks and discussion that these themes are central to the immigration debate: a. residents who have entered the country without legal documents or who have overstayed expired visas, b. seasonal agricultural workers for California and other major food producing states, and c. provisions for highly skilled scientists and engineers to enter the country legally or remain here after completing studies at America's fine universities. All of these pieces and more are under study. Sen. Barbara Mikulski is taking a good look at what to do about agricultural workers, for


On gun control:

The issue needs attention from the Congress. We need to reduce high-capacity ammo clips. Whatever is done must honor the Second Amendment. Mental health is a critical concern in the gun control debate. Look at it, deal with it, says Hoyer.

On Steny Hoyer:

"God has been good to me!" Mr. Hoyer plans to remain in the Congress as long as he can vigorously and effectively represent the District. And about those unfounded rumors floating around about a future Hoyer-Van Hollen ticket for public office, we can pretty much dismiss those out of hand. To that idea, Mr. Hoyer responds, Chis Van Hollen (Maryland's adjoining 8th District) is 20 years my junior and he will make it just fine on his own.

As it happens, our cantor is dual gifted and dual educated, holding advanced degrees in both music and theater. So, we thought this would be a good way to reach out into the community in order to grow while providing a service to the community. We want people to know where we are and for them to use our space.

Where did the idea for a community theater come

Actually, it came from our cantor, Franklin Akers, who is deeply committed to this church, and wants to see it grow in vitality and usefulness to Beltsville. He obtained permission from church

council to mount one production as a trial, and this is it. If successful, we are hoping council will want to make it permanent.

• Do you think there is any real need for a community theater group in Beltsville? There are so many of them around the Beltway.

That is exactly what we want to find out! We have two hurdles to leap: we have to get a cast, which will tell us whether actors want another outlet. Community theater actors are quite addicted to acting! Then, we must attract and build an audience. That will tell us if there is sufficient interest in Beltsville for such a project. We hope there is!

• What is to be your first production?

Three one act comedies by the 19th century Russian playwright, Anton Chekhov.

Comedies? Really? We thought Chekhov wrote dreary, pessimistic plays.

• That would seem so, but they
• are not really dreary and pessimistic if done properly. But these three plays are outright farces; they come close to slapstick ... pie throwing.... but not QUITE.

• Why were these plays chosen?

Actually, it was a partly practical. We have a budget of virtually zero and these plays are in public domain. Also, they can be can be done in modern dress with a minimum of set pieces. Our space is small, and not equipped for theatrical productions. So they can be done quite simply. AND they

are wonderful plays. They are what one might call "actor's plays." The telling of these three stories and the light they shed on human nature is the most important thing about them.





report from companies like Equifax and automated alerts when key changes appear on your accounts. In the event that the worst happens, some programs offer help through 24/7 access to identity theft resolution specialists.

Learn to be scam-savvy. Identity thieves are no fools - but they will try to fool you. Stay informed about scams and never give out personal information over the phone or on the Internet unless you initiated the contact and you're absolutely certain about whom you're dealing with. Keep in mind that the IRS does not ever request sensitive information via email - almost all official IRS communication is carried out

by regular mail.

■ Make sure you're using safe technology. Update your computer's anti-virus software and security patches and check to ensure that any site you're using is firewall-protected. Also, be aware that some photocopy machines have hard drives that store digital versions of anything they are used to copy.

Until next month, I remain yours in Service, not self. May God bless our troops wherever they are throughout the world and may God continue to bless America.



Baker Bill STUFF 'N THINGS

I can't believe I am writing for March. Anyhow, this time of year I recycle all papers with my information on them and clean out my desk drawers. In doing so I came across something that may be useful to some of you. It's a list of what you can substitute for something else. If you find this of interest write it down or e-mail me @ bill@bakerbill.net for the complete list.

- 1.To make buttermilk for a recipe, stir in 1 teaspoon lemon juice to a cup of milk and let it sit a bit. Vinegar also works
- 2. To make brown sugar, stir into a cup of sugar 1/4 cup molasses, more if you want to make it
- 3. As a thickener 1 tablespoon corn starch = 2 tbsp flour
- 4. 2 tbsp butter = 1 oz, 1 stick =1/2 cup or 4 oz
 - 5. Sugar 7 oz = 1 cup
- 6. A cup of flour weighs 4 & 1/2
- 7. 20 saltines crushed = 1 cup, 22 vanilla wafers = 1 cup, 1 med apple chopped = 1 cup, 1 medonion chopped = 1/2 cup, and 7-8 medium eggs = 1 cup or 8 oz.

Candy: Bring to boil 1/2 cup

Karo and 1 cup granulated sugar. To make caramel or hard candy here are the temps. Syrup thin thread 218-220, large thread 228-230, soft ball 242-240, hard ball 250-255, hard crack-285-315. Do not walk away because temperatures will rise fast, so keep stirring. Here's a neat tip: to test the ball, use cold water and only once.

If anyone remembers, 20 years

ago I called this article Bakerbill's baking tips. Then I ran out of tips and changed the heading to STUFF 'N THINGS. I still try to stick to baking and some cooking and now and then slip in personal thoughts. Even though I am a soso writer, I am no wordsmith, but I was a bakerysmith. Thank heaven for spellcheck.




