In most cases, an older cat is not the right companion for a new kitten. The roughhousing and energetic play that is characteristic of kittens may be annoying or even threatening to an older cat. Nevertheless, a pair of kittens may end up forging a good friendship with an older cat because they will have each other for aggressive play and can cuddle up with the older cat when it's time to rest.

Do not wait until the weeks before Christmas. Here in Dallas, we are processing ridiculous volumes of freight, and it is the same at many of the other companies in the industry.

This is going to be a short one. Enjoy your Thanksgiving and be thankful for family, friends, and coworkers. Let us continue to be respectful to one another and give true meaning to love. 

Development on Beltsville Agricultural Research Center

Last December in response to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers issued a report, Scoping Phase for the Bureau of Engraving and Printing Replacement Project relocation to the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center (BARC). In response to your inputs from a Town Hall, I provided inputs that questioned the initial assessment that the project would have little to no impact on traffic, the environment, the water, and energy usage.

This week we received notification via the issuance of a Draft Environmental Impact Study that the proposal to relocate the Bureau of Engraving & Printing from downtown D.C. to the BARC has moved forward.

As outlined the new BEP facility will cover 122 acres with a 1 million square foot building and 1,600 employees. Access will be off an entrance on Powder Mill Road. The actual facility is located adjacent to Vansville where the

The new report has stated there will be no to minimal impacts on land, visual aesthetics, air quality, noise, environment (except

potential slight impact on two (2) streams), traffic and transportation, utilities, hazardous waste, and human health and safety.

I want to hear what you have to say about this project so that your viewpoints are represented in my official response. But I also want you to review the Draft Environmental Impact Study (EIS) yourselves and provide your direct responses to the Army Corps of Engineers as well. Boot Camp at Riderwood Popular with Residents

Staying physically fit is one of the best things you can do to be able to continue to enjoy life as you get older. That's why so many people who live at Riderwood, an Erickson Living managed senior living community in Silver Spring, MD, make it a priority to exercise, whether that be walking briskly around the picturesque campus, swimming laps in the heated indoor pool, or taking a group exercise class at the on-site fitness center.

"We always end the class with some mat work where various core work, including Pilates' moves, is incorporated. We end the class with floor stretches and high fives."

Positive Results

Gurley says that people who take the boot camp class can expect to see an increase in their stamina, endurance, and overall strength as well as a big boost in self-confidence. Fitness manager Paula Butler says instructors can modify the exercises so that anyone can join in and go at their own pace. Plus, she says this kind of exercise has some unexpected benefits for older adults.

"In addition to the obvious improvements in functional and general strength, cardiovascular fitness and mobility, older adults also get brain health benefits from boot camp style classes," Butler says. "Utilizing intervals and rapidly switching between exercises requires faster neural signaling, so

Holiday Shopping Ideas 2020

It's November again and time to prepare for holiday shopping. It seems that many companies are running "Black Friday" sales for the entire month of November. This year COVID-19 has had a large impact on both shopping and on technology prices. The sudden demand for people working at home and students learning at home has made computers, laptops, printers, and headsets more expensive. There are still some technology bargains to be found.

3D printers

3D printers seem to have dropped in popularity with prices stabilized for many models between \$100 and \$300. If you are looking for a basic 3D printer, get one that supports a heated bed and at least PLA and ABS filament.

Mobile Phones

With new phones from Apple and Google having just been released, there are bargains to be found on last year's models. No need to worry about 5G; the technology isn't really ready yet with multiple reports that current 5G deployments are performing slower than 4G. It is probably best to wait a couple of years for 5G technology to mature before spending the extra money for a 5G phone. Many 4G phones are a bargain.

Voice Assistants, IoT Devices, and Cameras

The voice assistant market-



place has consolidated, leaving primarily Amazon and Google in the US market. Amazon sells three times the number of Alexa devices with 36% of the global market as Google, which has about 12% market share. Last year's model of the Amazon Dot can often be found for less than

IoT switches are devices that are used to control lamps plugged into the device. These are commonly available for \$6 to \$10 apiece and are normally controlled through your cell phone or voice assistant. Smart switches can automatically turn on or off based on various events like sunrise or sunset or time of day. Devices that are UL listed and do not require a subscription to an external cloud service to control are the best picks.

Doorbell and home security cameras seem to be all the rage this year. This seems strange to me during when we are all stuck at home anyway. Many of these

devices sell for more than \$100 to \$250 and then require a paid subscription to access the video. A company called Wyze has a line of IoT security cameras and other IoT products that mostly range from \$20 to under \$50 and do not require paid subscriptions.

TVs and Streaming **Boxes**

There are some excellent buys on low-end televisions. I recently saw some 32-inch and smaller 720p TVs for \$100. These are at the low end of the HD spectrum but may be perfect for a bedroom TV set. Most TVs today are going to be ultra-high definition (4K UHD), high dynamic range (HDR) televisions with resolutions of 3840 by 2160 pixels. Currently 55-inch UHD TVs are selling for under \$400. On the higher end, look for 55-inch OLED TVs for around \$1,300.

There are four major brands of media streaming boxes, Google

has a new Chromecast device which replaces both the earlier Chromecast video devices and Android TV devices. Apple released a new Apple TV, and Amazon released new Fire TV boxes this year. Roku still seems to be the best choice of product with the Roku Premiere on sale in many places for under \$30. Roku has avoided the disputes that have kept some streaming channels from appearing on certain boxes. Roku has added Apple TV, and Peacock, this year and also allows you to watch your Comcast channels without the need to rent an extra cable

Gaming

The Nintendo Switch game platform has been around since 2017, and the Switch Lite appeared last year. While Switch is a very popular platform, there isn't anything new here. The big news is that Sony has released the new PlayStation 5 (PS5) and Microsoft has released two new X box series X and S. These consoles now support 4K UHD HDR video running at 120 frames per second (FPS). In other words the games are beautiful on your modern UHD TV. The new platforms are also compatible with many of the games for the previous generation of consoles.

Game play streaming services allow the newest games to be played without a console or high end computer. Google introduced Stadia, and NVidia introduced GeForce Now. Both services typically want a small monthly subscription to use the platform and require the purchase of premium games to play. Both Microsoft and Amazon are testing their own services for release next year. This will be a technology to watch for next year, but subscriptions for current services may be a good gift for an early adopter.

Raspberry Pi

No, not for desert! The Raspberry Pi is a popular, small computer with the intention of allowing kids to learn computers the way we did on Commodore, Spectrum, and Atari computers decades ago. The Raspberry Pi organization has just released a new computer the Raspberry Pi 400. The 400 is built inside a keyboard on the same CPU as the Pi. The kit includes the keyboard computer, a mouse, a power cable, memory card, and the cable to plug it into the TV all for \$100. The software includes a web browser, office suite, multiple programming languages and tutorials for learning them, and even a few games. It connects to the Internet using an Ethernet cable or Wi-Fi. Look it up at https://raspberrypi.org.



processing speed improves. Additionally, boot camp style exercises tend to be more unconventional and complex than traditional strengthtraining exercises and require more executive functioning skills."

Community member Hue Phan used to get her exercise from linedancing and walking. She decided to challenge herself by taking the boot camp class twice a week.

"I love it and enjoy it a lot," Hue says. "It is a challenge for me, but I need a challenge."

After several months of taking the higher-intensity class, Hue says her balance has improved. When the coronavirus pandemic hit, many activities at Riderwood were changed or put on hold. The fitness center quickly pivoted by airing exercise classes on the community's on-site TV station so residents could work out from the safety of their own apartment homes.

"We were offering the class outside during the warmer months," Butler says of the boot camp class. "It will come back inside after we expand our group exercise programming."

Teacher of the Year Shares Distance-Learning Tips

(StatePoint) School closures and hybrid learning models have forced educators, parents and students to adapt to new forms of learning; the impact of this is not to be underestimated. Teachers and parents around the country have expressed concerns about the accessibility and quality of education under these conditions.

Fortunately, new tools and educational resources are being made accessible to help tackle these concerns. "Teacher of the Year" and author Michael Bonner is sharing resourceful ways for educators, students, families and communities to address some of the common challenges associated with distance- and hybrid-learning.

1. Students: Create Personalized Workspaces: When students have a lack of comfort, stress has a way of compounding at an exponential level. To combat this, focus on the things that create a productive and inviting learning environment, like creating a workspace that is functional, fun and organized. The good news is that it doesn't require many materials to create a DIY desk and it's a great activity to do together. Using science trifolds and heavy-duty tape, parents and kids can create private cubicles that can be propped up on any surface and customized to their liking – be creative and look to bring things into the space that will keep your child

energized and motivated. 4.

- Parents: Increase Communication Touchpoints: With most schools operating through some variation of distance- or hybrid-learning, communication is a key asset for parents. Staying in regular contact with your child's teacher can help you better understand and track how your child is performing and get ahead of any potential issues or concerns. Parents should feel empowered to reach out to their child's teacher for progress updates or to address any areas of confusion with class schedules or assignments. Something as simple as sending a bi-weekly email with questions could help improve the overall experience for you and your child.
- Teachers: Keep Kids Engaged: Teachers can break up the day by infusing different educational games and hands-on learning opportunities like 3M Science at Home. This online STEM video series is a great example of how students can tap into their curiosity about the world around them. By discussing observations and giving kids a chance to ask questions and come up with solutions, teachers and parents can foster a growth mindset while keeping kids engaged.
- Working Community: Together to Improve Educational Access and Equity: COVID-19 has forced organizations, businesses and education systems to configure new frameworks to continue functioning. Unfortunately, educators are facing a huge wall as roughly 15 percent of U.S. households with school-age children do not have the high-speed internet connection at home needed to complete their assignments, according to Pew Research Center data.

While options may vary based on a school district's ability to provide resources, parents can reach out to their local community boards and school districts to see what options are available to them. Some schools are creating hotspots or are teaming with local libraries and community partners such as churches and businesses to extend their connections.

As we all adjust to new educational models, ensuring learning is engaging and fun doesn't have to be challenging, it can start with just a few simple techniques. Whether you are modifying a space to be more inviting for learning or finding supplemental, interactive activities to break up the day, diversifying your approach will help students better retain information and grasp new concepts while having fun.



would like to be able to help them as well. We hope you can assist us in these worthwhile endeavors.


