Officer Adrian Morris, 23, of Prince George's County Police District VI in Beltsville, was killed while in pursuit of a suspect vehicle on Route 95 at about 1 p.m. on Monday, Aug. 20. The police cruiser went off the road in Beltsville near the intersection of Powder Mill Road. Officer Morris was ejected by the impact and suffered severe head injuries.

Fifty Ways to Win Customers

Marshall Bays, General Manager of the Ackerman Security Beltsville Offices lined up a series of marketing steps every business can use to improve its business. Bays spoke at the August Greater Beltsville Business Association meeting at Cross Creek Golf Clubhouse. He led an intensive marketing workshop. He is a member of the GBBA Board of Directors.

Ackerman, so you know, sells security monitoring services for \$18.95 per month – a savings over other monitoring services of as much as \$30 to \$40 per month. The goal of each salesperson is one contract a day. Ackerman in the two years in Beltsville has moved from 0 sales to the fifth largest service in the area.

Business can signal their enthusiasm and conviction by stockpiling a series of marketing steps that surely distinguish their business:

- · Choose a color scheme for your business. Ackerman chose red, white and blue for obvious reasons.
- Print a folder to be handed to customers with your business name in large type on the front, with a phrase that distinguishes your business. It is crisp-looking.
- Print and use what he called "flimsy" business cards which are really "peal and stick" cards that can be pasted inside your folder, on the back of a contract or left on the door of a customer who wasn't home to tell him or her you were there.
- Ackerman paints their logo on the hood and roof of their service vans to ensure they are recognized by high rise condo residents.
- · Get a distinctive phone number. Marshall worked to convince Encyclopedia Britannica, when he

worked there, to adopt such a number maybe involving the word Education. Didn't get it done, but Ackerman's service number is 888-999-1070, a distinctive and easy-to-remember number for when they need service.

Ackerman has a yard sign, as most security companies do, that is easily converted to a house number sign simply by adding the house number to the stake holding the Ackerman sign. His sample sign bore the date, 1967, when Ackerman was founded in Atlanta. Beltsville, Md. is the only other office.

Ackerman salespeople calling on homes have to pass multiple exams ensuring management they are responsible and no threat to representatives; insist on prompt follow-up to interested prospects again to distinguish themselves from others where the failure to show rate runs as high as 50 percent.

Beltsville Resident Elected State President of the American Legion Auxiliary

Prince George's County Early Childhood Department Expanding Opportunities for Toddlers

Prince George's County Public Schools System (PGCPS) encourages parents to register their two and three-yearold children for the upcoming school year. The Early Childhood Department will provide an opportunity for two and threeyear-olds with varying disabilities and non-disabled peers to learn in the same classroom together one to three half-days a week. Two and three-year-old students with disabilities may be eligible for participation in the program through an IFSP or the IEP process. All children will have access to developmentally appropriate curriculum

which includes learning centers for activities such as dramatic play, exploration or sand and water, computer learning, math/ science, art and writing. Prior to enrollment three-year-old children need to be toilet-trained with few to no accidents and demonstrate typical developmental skills for a their age.

Families may register students for the 2012-2013 school year who are two or three years old as of Sept. 1. These students will be admitted on a spaceavailable basis. Registration will be held at each Early Childhood Center. Beginning June 4, enrollment will be open to all

children at their boundary Early Childhood Center. Parents will be required to provide documents required for registration in PGCPS. Parents will be required to bring proof of income, proof of birth, signed current deed/ lease, or notarized shared housing documentation, two current pieces of mail showing name and address, and immunization record. Parents will be required to complete a student application/profile during registration.

There is no fee. Transportation will not be provided. Parents must arrange transportation.

Rosapepe's Report to Beltsville

How to Save Money After Power Failures

As you know, Delegates Barbara Frush, Joseline Peña-Melnyk, Ben Barnes, and I have pushed PEPCO hard to restore power after failures and to invest in making their systems less vulnerable to storms. And, of course, we oppose letting them charge you for electricity you never got! We'll support legislation in the next session to stop them. But for now, the best thing to do is to look at your bills from PEPCO, Verizon, and Comcast and request refunds if you believe you're owed one. A recent article from the Baltimore Sun explains their policies and gives their contact info. Below are the most relevant details. The amounts may not be large. But it's your money, not theirs. PEPCO residential customers can lodge a complaint by calling 202.872.2452 and speaking with a claims assistant between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

VERIZON is "honoring requests for out-of-service refunds due to the storm." Customers can inquire about a refund at 800-837-4966 or go online at http://www.verizon.com/support. Refunds are usually handled on a case-by-case basis. COMCAST won't give credit to customers whose cable service was disrupted during the recent power outage; however, if a customer's cable remained out of service even after power returned, Comcast will consider a credit on a "case-by-case basis." You can make your case by calling Comcast at 800-COMCAST.

Newly Created County Department of

Permits, Inspections and Enforcement

Last month, Prince George's County Executive Rushern Baker began the process of creating the Department of Permits, Inspections and Enforcement. The core responsibilities of this new department will include issuing permits, conducting commercial and residential property inspections, and enforcing property standards. This will allow the current departments that handle these areas, Department of Environmental Resources (DER) and Department of Public Works and Transportation to focus on their core functions, improving their performance as well.

According to Baker, "All too often in Prince George's County we have heard concerns about issues within our permitting system. From obtaining a Use and Occupancy permit to building a fence in one's backyard, the permitting process takes too long." The goal of this new department is to increase efficiency and improve consistency, predictability, as well as streamline com-

munications to both business and residential stakeholders.

Online Voter Registration

Last month, the State Board of Elections announced that for the first time ever, Marylanders can register to vote and update their address information online. This is a big step forward in making the voting process more accessible and efficient through a secure system

Strategic Couponing

I started couponing nearly 60 years ago with my grandmother, Ada. She collected S&H Green Stamps and Plaid Stamps. They were collectively known as trading stamps. The more Grandma shopped, the more stamps she got. I remember licking stamps for those stamp books until I got a cramp in my tongue. The glue was not very tasty but I kept on licking because I knew we were trying to get a reward. Pots, dishes, utensils, a television or whatever I saw in the catalog, I just knew one more lick could mean the difference between a coffeepot and a radio. Ironically, I cannot remember any of the items we received from the many boxes of trading stamp books we redeemed.

My parents also couponed in the 1960s and early 1970s. They collected the coupons from the Raleigh's cigarette packs. They quickly stopped when the first rumblings began about tobacco causing lung cancer. They had hundreds of coupons but, again, I do not remember a single item we got from redeeming those coupons.

Fast forward a few years to 1974 when I found myself with a new husband and beautiful baby daughter and no job. I was on maternity leave for eight weeks. We adopted our daughter, which meant I was not eligible for paid maternity leave. I remember going to the local A&P with a fist full of coupons hoping to be able to use a few of them to lower my grocery bill. I don't remember what I purchased or how much I saved. It must have been worthwhile because I kept on couponing for several more years while on unpaid summer vacations from my job as a school teacher. I don't remember when I stopped.

I continued to cut a coupon here and there but nothing on the scale of what I do now; I have become obsessed. I tend to have an addictive personality about things I enjoy. I love saving money with my coupons.

My husband and I are retired now and 38 years after I couponed as a new mother, I have returned to couponing. I, like many of you, saw the show, *Extreme Couponing* in 2010. I watched with my mouth wide open for the entire show. I was hooked. At the same time, I said to myself, "Oh, oh! The stores are not going to be happy with this revelation." And they

weren't

The grocery stores, pharmacies, and any other merchant that accepts coupons are changing their coupon policies to discourage extreme couponing. Couponing is not like it used to be back when it was underground when housewives carted away loads of free or almost free household supplies from their local grocery store. In this area, it is very unlikely that you will be able to coupon the way it is depicted on those television shows but you don't have to be an extreme couponer to save tons of money on your groceries, clothing or anything else. Take what you learn from me and others like me and use it to change your shopping lifestyle and you will save money.

I love standing and watching the bottom line shrink when I scan my loyalty card, my store coupons and manufacturers' coupons and then get even more coupons with my receipt. I love it. My goal is to help you begin to have fun and reap the rewards of couponing.

If I can take a breather from couponing once in a while, I will share some of the things I have learned about strategic couponing. I have been able to save (on average) 50%-70% every time I shop at the grocery store or pharmacy. If you would like to learn how to become a strategic couponer and/or a better shopper, check out some of the coupon class offerings listed below.

More than 25,000 Marylanders Impacted by Komen Maryland Funding in 2011

Baker Bill STUFF 'N THINGS

Here is a good recipe to start the baking year off. In a medium size bowl place 3/4 cup sugar, 1 cup flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, a pinch of salt. Mix together. Now add 2 eggs and ¼ cup milk and mix well. Add ½ cup oil, stir in 3 heaping tablespoons cream corn, stir in 4 heaping tablespoon corn meal and mix all well. Spray muffin pan (6) or a small baking pan. This is just enough for a 6 pack or 1 pan corn bread. Bake at 410 degrees for about 15 minutes; there should be no wet spots. Note: you can use any vegetable oil. Use the balance of the cream corn in your favorite pancake recipe. To make corn fritters, add to a Bisquick recipe.






