House Fire on Howard Court Claims One

Around 3:30 am on Saturday, May 12, fire crews responded to a house fire at 11405 Howard Court in Beltsville. According to the PG County Fire Department, when crews arrived the majority of the 2-story house was in flames. The fire was intense enough to prevent firefighters from entering the residence right

A neighbor, Kathy Mellott, told NBC 4 they were "devastated because they didn't know anyone was in there." When the firefighters were finally able to go into the home, they found certain areas were unreachable because of the damage. They did find

one person, 35-year-old Sally Ann Quesenberry, deceased inside the residence. Her three children were not home at the time.

Fire crews did not find any smoke alarms inside the house, according to Mark Brady, spokesman for the Prince George's County Fire and EMS Department. Although the cause is still being investigated, the common denominator between this and other fatal house fires this year seems to be the lack of a working smoke detector.

On Saturday, May 10, the Beltsville Seventh-day Adventist Church was the venue of a very informative session on cybersafety for teenagers and adults. This information session saw Captain Susan Smith, assistant commissioner of District IV of the Prince George's County Police Department, as the main facilitator supported by Lt Matt Barber (PG Police Department and the Family Justice Center) and Mignon Brown Anderson of The Lakeisha Brown Foundation. Also in attendance were members of the





Faith Advisory Council as well as other partners of the Family Justice Center, which is an initiative of the Circuit Court for Prince George's County. (The Family Justice Center [FJC] was created to provide services for survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, human trafficking, and elder abuse).

According to Captain Smith, there is a need to educate teenagers and other young people on issues that could potentially be problems in their lives. She

focused on cybersecurity and safety, cyberbullying, and dating. Many useful tips were shared in her presentation. Ultimately, she said the choice to be safe is at the discretion of the individual. She said, "You must learn to conceal your personal details

online, never agree to meet an internet acquaintance in person, block your apps from using your location, and sexting may be a criminal act that borders on child pornography."

Captain Smith further cautioned young persons to avoid doing things online that they would not do in person. She went on to advise young people that potential employers and colleges have the ability to research people online, so be wary of what one posts. Parents were also advised



to be very involved in setting up privacy settings for their children and make friends with them online to monitor what is being said and done. She also revealed the reality of Internet Addiction Disorder (IAD), which now gives people trouble sleeping, among other things.

On the issue of cyberbullying, she highlighted the different dangers online and the classification of bullies that exist. The example of sharing pictures online was brought up. Persons in attendance were reminded that what is posted online stays on forever. People can use pictures to bully and blackmail others. "When one is confronted by a potential bully, stop responding to the person. Tell a trusted adult. Save any evidence and notify the app administrator," said

Captain Smith.

Parents were encouraged to research the term secret apps as a form of monitoring the activities of their children.

Concluding her presentation, she indicated that there are many people sitting in jail from domestic violence. She said there are horror stories of what is going on in Beltsville and beyond about domestic violence. "It is real," she said. "Men are less likely to report domestic violence. There are lots of resources for men and women to get help on domestic violence. Domestic violence is all about power and control." She encouraged parents not to be afraid to have the conversation about the topic with their children. "Talk regularly to your children about what they do online."

Maryland Native Rides Across the Country with Copilot Pooch to Honor His Mother Who Passed Away from Lung Disease

Breathe for Mom: A Mother's Day Ride

CROFTON, MD (May 7, 2018)—Will Tucker has never ridden a motorcycle before, but he's now making a long ride on one during a cross-country trip from Minneapolis to Crofton, MD—with his dog McKenzie—to honor his mother, Julie Gray/Tucker, who passed away at age 53 on March 14 of acute interstitial pneumonitis (AIP). All proceeds from the ride are going towards research for interstitial lung

able to take it and have to learn the hard way," said Will Tucker, whose journey is called, *Breathe* for Mom: A Mother's Day Ride.

Tucker lives in Minneapolis but grew up in Crofton, MD. "When I made the snap decision to take my motorcycle permit test while at the DMV last week, I quickly shifted gears to try to find a bike suitable to take myself and McKenzie back home for Mother's Day as it's the first Mother's Day my family and



diseases in hopes of preventing other people, friends, and families from having to go through this lung disease. Tucker has created a fundraising page on Facebook, and proceeds will benefit the American Lung Association in Maryland's mission: to save lives by improving lung health and preventing lung disease. Tucker's initial fundraising goal of \$5,000 was hit in less than 24 hours before he ever sat on the bike.

"Yes—it's true that I have never sat on a motorcycle prior to attempting to purchase one. Yes—it's true that I've been told this may be the dumbest thing I've ever attempted to do. But in honor of my relationship with my mom, I knew that I needed to make it back to Maryland with my best friend, adorable Chesapeake, and mom's granddogger, McKenzie, in the most defiant way I possibly could think of. Because that was our relationship—she'd always give me advice, and I'd never be

I will have to endure without my mom," said Tucker.

The signs and symptoms of AIP generally develop and progress rapidly. In the early stages of the condition, affected people may experience upper respiratory and/ or viral-like symptoms such as a cough, shortness of breath, and fever. This is followed by the rapid onset of respiratory failure and the need for mechanical ventilation in the majority of cases. The underlying cause of AIP is unknown. Most cases occur sporadically in people with no family history of the condition. There is, unfortunately, no proven treatment for AIP. Supportive care is generally recommended to address the signs and symptoms of the condition. Glucocorticoid therapy and other immunosuppressive therapies are often used; however, the benefits of these treatments remain unclear. according to the NIH (National Institutes of Health).

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


#StandUp Event at the Mark at Brickyard

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

Family Justice Center Reaches Out to Beltsville Residents

The Family Justice Center (FJC), on Saturday, May 12, in collaboration with the Beltsville Seventh-day Adventist Church, reached out to residents in an open forum presentation and discussion on domestic violence. The FJC was supported in the initiative by representatives of the Faith Advisory Council, District IV of the Prince George's County Police Department, and some of the partners of the FJC.

Introducing the FJC to those present, the head of that agency, Lt. Matt Barba, described it as a one-stop shop for victim services. It was established as an initiative of the Circuit Court of Prince George's County as a multiagency and multidisciplinary organization to enhance the provision of services for survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, and human

trafficking, among other things.

Lt. Barba indicated that, in 2018, one of the objectives of the establishment is teen empowerment and education because there is a lot of victimization in schools in PG County.

Following his brief but informative presentation, Ashley Grier of the FJC introduced Mignon Brown Anderson as a featured speaker for the day. Ms. Anderson is the president of The Lakeisha Brown Foundation in Washington,

In a very detailed presentation, she spoke about how she lost her 18-year-old daughter to a perpetrator of domestic violence. Herself a survivor of domestic violence for a long time, she advised those present that it is imperative to talk to our young people and gain their trust so when signs of domestic violence are detected help can be sought immediately. She went on to explain how she also lost a niece to domestic violence. She encouraged that it is most important for persons to know that there are vast resources in the community to help deal with such situations and that human life does not have to be lost.

The audience was reminded that part of the remedial action that can

be taken in domestic violence situations is to talk to a trusted person; learn about one's legal rights and legal protection; make a safety plan (whether or not one wants to stay); and, among other things, make a special "help" signal with neighbors or kids; keep your cell phone charged and ready for emergencies; and, finally, document potential evidencethreatening notes, messages, pictures, and other proof of abuse.

Captain Susan Smith, assistant police commissioner for PG County District IV, reminded people that law enforcement would always need some form of proof to work with

to effect successful prosecution of any perpetrator(s).

Other partners who were present were members of the local Faith Advisory Council: Reverend Oswen and Lady Cameron; Juanita Cameron of the Lighthouse Ministries; Jewel Eugene, who runs a nongovernmental organization; and Deb Stefany of St. John's Episcopal Church. The Beltsville Seventh-day Adventist Church was represented by Pastor Sifa Potauaine and Nescoe Lettsome, deputy director of the Beltsville Broncos Pathfinder Club.

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


Fork Union Military Academy. This award from the Alumni Association is one of the highest honors to be received by a cadet and recognizes

Linux

According to *Wired* magazine, 67% of the computers running the Internet are powered by Linux. So what is Linux, and is it only for servers or can it be useful for personal computers? I will try to answer these questions in this month's column.

What is Linux

Linux is an operating system created in the early 90's by a Finnish computer science Student name Linus Torvalds. We will get back to Linux's origins in a moment; first, let's explain "operating system." The operating system is the software that supports a computer's basic functions. Windows, Android, MacOS, and iOS are all examples of operating systems that you may have encountered. Android, in fact, is a derivative of Linux designed for phones and other devices.

Linux History

When Linus Torvalds started to create Linux in 1991, he didn't need to start from scratch but rather was able to stand on the shoulders of others. The idea for Linux came from Minix, a small, UNIX-like operating system designed to teach students about operating system design that was published in a book in 1987 and released on a floppy disk. Linus was also able to leverage programs that had been created for the GNU project.

The GNU Project

GNU stands for Gnu's Not Unix. In 1985, Richard Stallman published an article in the Dr. Dobbs Journal calling for people to join and create an open-source, Unix-like operating system, replicating all of the tools that currently existed in the Unix operating system of the time. A number of these tools had already been developed by Mr. Stallman, but this call to arms got a number of people interested in helping. His reason for doing this was UNIX had up to this time been available to universities for a very low cost making it a good learning tool. But AT&T had announced that the cost for a UNIX source-code license was going to increase significantly, putting it out of reach of most universities. He felt that software should be free so people could read the code and make changes if desired, so he created the Free Software Foundation (FSF) and the Gnu Public License (GPL) to support the creation of software that would forever remain free. As Stallman says: "Free as in Freedom not as in beer."

By 1991, most of the support needed to build an operating system was there including programming languages and other required tools thanks to the GNU project and the FSF. Linus built his new Linux operating system using these tools and provided the missing component from GNU: the operating system kernel. Linus is still supporting and guiding the development of the Linux kernel to this very day.

Linux Distributions

Linux is both free and open-source software (FOSS) allowing different people and organizations to create their own versions of Linux. Normally, a specific type of Linux is called a Linux Distribution. Debian, Fedora, Raspian, Arch, and Ubuntu are all examples of popular Linux distributions. Linux distributions are created to serve different needs to use Linux in different ways and by different people. Linux runs on standard desktop PC's (replacing Windows for example) and on small computers like the Raspberry Pi. It also is popular for using in the Internet of Things running in home routers and TV set-top boxes for example, and you are running a derivative of Linux if you are using an Android phone or other device. Linux is also the operating system used for most cloud computing environments. Some examples of how distributions are used include:

Use	Distributions
Desktop/Windows replacement	Mint Linux, Ubuntu, and variants
Raspberry Pi	Raspbian
Internet Servers	Ubuntu Server, Red Hat, Fedora, CentOS
Routers and IoT	Open WRT, DD-WRT, Arch Linux
Windows Recovery CD	Gentoo

A good place to learn about more Linux distributions is https://distrowatch.com. The site tracks more than 100 different Linux distributions, tracking those that are most popular and notifying when distributions are updated.

Try Linux Out

It is easy to try out Linux on your Windows PC. All you need to do is download a copy (I suggest the Ubuntu distributions) and create an Ubuntu Live DVD or Bootable USB drive. Ubuntu 18.04 was recently released and can be found here: https://www.ubuntu.com/ along with the instructions for how to create the DVD or USB drive. When you are ready to try Linux, just boot the computer from the DVD or USB, and it will run Linux without changing your Windows hard drive at all. I often use this to securely access my financial account since I know the DVD can't be compromised.

Another fun and easy way to play with Linux is to get and set up the \$35 Raspberry Pi computer or the even less expensive \$10 Raspberry Pi Zero W.

Next Month

Next month maybe I will cover how to use Linux to salvage old computers and some of the software that runs on Linux. Until then, have a great month.



Striped bass season began on May 16 with new regulations pertaining to the use of bait, gear, and hooks.

New Striped Bass Regulations Effective May 16

Enhanced Conservation Rules on Use of Bait and Hooks; Minimum Size Reduced to 19 Inches

The opening of regular striped bass season, May 16, begins with new conservation-minded regulations pertaining to the use of bait, gear, and hooks.

The Maryland General Assembly Joint Committee Administrative, Executive, and Legislative Review Committee recently approved Maryland Department of Natural Resources regulations, which are effective now through Oct. 12, 2018.

Beginning May 16, 2018, in the Chesapeake Bay and its tidal tributaries:

- 1. Anglers must use non-offset circle hooks when live-lining or chumming;
- 2. Anglers must use circle hooks or "J" hooks when using fish, crabs, or worms as bait or

when using processed baits;

3. The minimum size for striped bass is 19 inches.

"The new rockfish regulations seek to address the shared concerns of anglers, charters, and conservationists who have reported high mortality rates of sub-legal rockfish," Fishing and Boating Service Director David Blazer said. "The new rules aim to increase fishing opportunity and success while reducing unnecessary mortality in the bay."

While the emergency regulations are in effect, the department is also moving forward with regulations aimed at making them permanent through the remainder of the 2018 and 2019

fishing seasons. Public comment is being accepted through May 29, 2018, with a public hearing scheduled for 6 pm May 17 at the Annapolis Friends Meeting House.

Staff have begun a proactive education and public relations campaign to ensure that anglers, bait-and-tackle shops, charter boat captains, and the Maryland Natural Resources Police understand the new striped bass minimum size and corresponding gear requirements.

After the regulations sunset in 2019, the department will use new stock assessment data to determine if the new conservation actions were preventing mortality as designed and intended.

The Clean Water Project

Prince George's County, in alliance with the Clean Water Partnership (CWP) program, has been working on the planning and design of a water quality improvement project in the Birmingham Estates Community. The CWP program has identified 11 locations in the Birmingham Estates neighborhood where stormwater filtration structures could be installed. The project will install tree box filters in various locations within the community. Construction is projected to start in summer 2018.

To better inform the community about this project, we are hosting a meeting to share project information, discuss potential roadway closures and detours, and answer questions from community members. The meeting will be on Tuesday, May 29 at 6 p.m. at Beltsville Academy, 4300 Wicomico Avenue, Beltsville, MD 20705. Night on the Wild Side was the National Wildlife Visitor Center's annual fundraiser event. It was full of great wildlife information about what the Patuxent Research Refuge has been doing throughout many years in our area. The first thing all saw as they approached the visitor center on this beautiful spring day was a family of timber wolves located a short distance from the entrance. The male and female wolves were there with their four pups playing around their feet, much like the human families who visit here year after year. These intriguing wild wolves, of course, are depicted in the beautifully bronzed sculpture *Timber Wolf Family* created by sculptor William H. Turner and were very generously donated by Dorothy R. Blair to the wildlife center in 1997.

The attendees then entered the visitor center through its double-door entrances with recently installed, exciting window graphics across the doors and all the large, glass front windows with many forms of wildlife displayed on them. These were all done for a very important purpose: to protect our beautiful and treasured wildlife birds from colliding into the clear glass, which the birds cannot see as glass, and dying from their injuries. Artist Lynne Parks* along with artist Chris Siron had designed the silhouette images, and the Beltsville visual communications firm of Jay Williams Design Company had them printed and installed. 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Club News

A Nutshell History of the **Bowie-Vansville Association**

The Bowie-Vansville Association (BVA) was begun in 1921 as part of a special University of Maryland project through a grant to disabled WWI veterans. The original coordinator was Agricultural Extension Agent Eugene Jenkins, who did extensive work with various types of clubs and who became a prominent state 4-H agent. In the days immediately following WWI, the Department of Agriculture recognized a need to disseminate knowledge, especially about such things as food conservation and productive daily living, to the general public. Without television or much radio available, a means of doing this was through the formation of clubs under the guidance of the Extension Service.

One such club formed by local farmers from the Bowie and Vansville (Beltsville) voting districts was the Bowie-Vansville Association, founded in 1921 and incorporated with a state charter in 1932. The purpose of this organization was "to further the interests of the community, to discuss the affairs of the community, and to promote the members' welfare." As stated in the original bylaws, some of the objectives were "to discuss the economic problems confronting the members with regards both to production and to marketing, and, to make country life less monotonous, less irksome, better rewarded, and more attractive." Early meetings were held in tents and in members' homes. Land for club use was donated in what is now the City of Greenbelt, but a lack of roads made that "garden spot of the world" inaccessible. A more suitable location in what is now the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center was donated by Lena Knauer,"The Mother of the Community," in 1929; it was deeded to the BVA in 1932 when the clubhouse was started being built. The original plot in Greenbelt was exchanged for help with the building of the clubhouse at the new location. When the U.S. Government

came into the area and began purchasing farms for a national research center, more and more people sold their properties and moved away. During the Great Depression years of the early 1930's, almost everyone succumbed to the lure of more urban living, as well as to the need for cash. The BVA clubhouse and the association remained intact, however, even though the members then had to come from miles away to attend meetings and functions. The club has been serving the community for almost 100 years, although that community is now more spread out than in the early days. Original civic activities included cooperative buying of lime, fertilizer, and other supplies, fighting with the county commissioners about roads, and holding farm produce festivals complete with blue ribbons and prizes. The first committees formed were the Roads Committee and the Schools Committee, with the Committee on Entertainment following soon afterward. The roads and the schools committees are now

defunct, but the present Ways and Means Committee is still alive. The club sponsored many drives and activities for such groups as Martha's Closet and other local food pantries and was for many years an avid supporter of the now-closed Great Oaks Home for the Developmentally Disabled. It now supports the Beltsville Women's Club in its efforts to provide Christmas gifts for needy children.

The BVA Minutes Books contain a history of almost ten decades of fellowship among varying groups of people. The fun and camaraderie shared over the years continue, especially at the annual crab feast held every year on the Saturday after the Fourth of July. 
