The Rev. Joseph M. Constant to Join St. John's Episcopal Church in Beltsville, MD As Their Next Rector

The Rev. Joseph M. Constant has accepted the position of Rector at St. John's Episcopal Church in Beltsville, MD. His tenure begins on Mar. 22nd. Joseph comes to St. John's after serving as priest-in-charge at Holy Comforter Episcopal Church in Washington, DC.

A native of Haiti, Joseph comes to St. John's with twelve years of experience as a priest. He holds a Bachelor of Science in Engineering from Northeastern University and a Master of Divinity from Virginia Theological Seminary. After graduation from seminary, he served as the Assistant Rector at St. Timothy's Episcopal Church in Washington, DC for almost 2 years. Then,

he joined the staff at Virginia Theological Seminary in 2005 as Assistant to the Dean for Admissions and Community Life. During his time at the Seminary, he created the Office of Racial and Ethnic Ministries and served as Director of Ethnic Ministries.

In 2010, following the earthquake in Haiti, Joseph joined the staff of the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church as a Special Coordinator for Haiti. The task of the Special Coordinator for Haiti was to facilitate the multiple efforts among Episcopal churches, dioceses, networks, and organizations committed to the rebuilding of the Diocese of Haiti.

In 2005, he established Haiti Micah Project, Inc. (HMP), a nonprofit committed to serv-



High Shine

If you find yourself shuttering instinctively at the thought of high gloss walls take a gamble on gloss anyway. You will be pleasantly surprised by the versatility that comes from high shine. The sheen will reflect light as it bounces off the walls, giving a traditional four feet wide entry hallway a more spacious feel. A great color for the hallway is Benjamin Moore's Rich Cream. When mixed in a high gloss finish it will look invitingly creamy and blend easily with other hues in adjacent rooms. Another area that always looks amazing in a high sheen is the dining room ceiling. ing the needs of the at-risk and homeless children of Mirebalais, Haiti. Through a vast network of partnerships created by Joseph and HMP, over 500 children receive a hot meal on a daily basis and have access to basic education.

Joseph has published a book entitled, No Turning Back: The Black Presence at Virginia Theological Seminary. His published paper on James Cone can also be found in The Blackwell Companion to the Theologians, Ian Markham, editor. Joseph and his wife Sarah have two daughters, Claire and Christiana. Tech Sense

Securing Windows

Microsoft stopped supporting Windows XP for most users almost a year ago. This means that most security updates that are applied to Windows 7 and 8 are not being provided for Windows XP. I developed these recommendations to aid users who were not ready to upgrade their version of Windows. If they are followed, the risk of malware being installed onto the computer is greatly reduced but not entirely eliminated. These suggestions will reduce the risk for Windows Vista, 7 and 8.1 as well.

Install a Current Anti-Virus Product

The most important step is to make sure you have a current antivirus product installed. In Jan. we discussed several products that could be installed and used for free. I suggest installing a recent copy of Avast Anti-Virus or AVG Free Anti-Virus. These products currently support all versions of Windows from XP through 8.1

(and Windows 10).

Remove Administration Rights from your Primary Account

Most Windows home computers by default have a single primary account with full administrative privileges. This has proven to be a weakness. In order to fix this we need to create a new user account. On Windows XP use:

- Start->Control Panel->User Accounts->Create New Account.
- 2. Enter a name for the new user, I often choose the name Manager for this account.
- Select Computer Administrator for the account type and select the Create Account Button.
- On the User Account Windows select Change Account and then select the new account just created, (Manager in my example).
- Select Create Password and enter an easily remembered password twice.

6. Enter a reminder in case you forget the password in the future and select the Create Password.

Now you have a new administrative account that is password protected. Next we need to remove administrative rights from the primary account. First, let's logout of the current account and login with the new account. From the Start menu select logoff and logoff the current user. The computer should show you a logon screen. Logon to the new user account (Manager) and enter the password. Once you are logged in go to Start -> Control Panel -> User Accounts and select your primary user account.

- Select change account type.
- Select Limited Account and select the Change Account Type button.

You may now log out of the manager account and back into your primary account. Your primary account is now secure. Most software that tries to install itself will require you to provide the account and password of the admin account giving you a chance to stop an unintended installation before it starts. Do not use the Manager account for dayto-day activities.

These steps are similar for Windows Vista, 7, 8 and 8.1.

Disable Internet Explorer

The next step is to replace Internet Explorer with Chrome or Firefox. Internet Explorer for your older computer is no longer being updated and has known security issues. Firefox can be downloaded and installed from https://www. mozilla.org and Chrome can be downloaded and installed from https://www.google.com/chrome. Each of these browsers will ask

if you want to make the browser the default browser. If you have already installed the browsers you can use the settings to select the browser as your default browser.

At this point we do not actually need to uninstall Internet Explorer and doing so might break other things in Windows. What you should do is remove any short-cuts to Internet Explorer by deleting them. This will prevent accidental use of Internet Explorer from

Done for Now

We are done with this for now and if you followed the steps your Windows computer will be less vulnerable to malware attacks.

African-American History Club leads American Heart Association's awareness campaign at retirement community

SILVER SPRING, MD-As a retired nurse educator from the University of District of Columbia, Barbara Baskerville knows that health awareness saves lives.

"Being informed about your health is a powerful tool," stated Ms. Baskerville, a resident of Riderwood retirement community in Silver Spring who served twenty-one years as a nurse in the U.S. Army, both in active duty and the reserves. She is currently a member of the Resident Advisory Council, serving as its Liaison to the Medical Center.

That is why she enlisted the support of her fellow members of Riderwood's resident-led African-American History Club to spearhead the American Heart Association's Go Red for Women campaign at the Erickson Living community on February 6th. Charles Curry, MD, a resident of Riderwood and retired cardiologist from Howard University Hospital, served as the guest speaker.

Why a focus on heart disease by the African-American History Club? "The Heart Truth," according to the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute, is that heart disease disproportionately affects women of color. African-American women have high rates of the major risk factors for heart disease.

Donning their red attire, the group hosted a presentation on heart health, including talking with a physician about risk factors and setting heart health goals. Members received "red dress" pins and committed to sharing information about the topic with others.

"Heart disease has traditionally been viewed as an 'older man's disease,' but that couldn't be further from reality," noted Ms. Baskerville. "The American Heart Association notes that cardiovascular disease claims the lives of 500,000 women in the United States annually, so education is vital. Further, since heart disease does not care how you look on the outside, the goal of the African American History Club is that all residents and staff will engage in heart healthy endeavors. We were pleased to be a part of the national Go Red for Women Day."

seniors who have demonstrated a high level of proficiency in English and at least one other language, I have introduced a bill to create the MD Seal of Bi-literacy. With the ever-expanding global economy, MD businesses are in need of bi-literate individuals who can help them compete in the global marketplace. Recognizing students with these language skills will give MD businesses an edge, promote employment of our recent graduates, and help college admission counselors select the most qualified candidates for their international studies and other programs.

Making our streets more friendly to bicyclists and pedestrians

Between 2003 and 2012, 5,799 people total were killed in traffic-related crashes in MD, 1,067 of them while walking. Such preventable, needless tragedies indicate a need for renewed focus on safety for everyone utilizing MD's roadways. As driving continues to decline in MD, and walking, cycling, and transit usage rises, there is an urgent need to

address the safety of all MD travelers.

20 years ago, when I represented Beltsville in the House of Delegates I sponsored the state law creating Bicycle Pedestrian Priority Areas (BPPAs) in MD. The bill was intended to 1) allow the designation of such areas (which need both state and local designation if the area includes a state highway), 2) promote plans to increase safety and access for bicycle and pedestrian traffic after an area is designated, and 3) targeting funds to implement the recommended improvements. Montgomery County thus far is the only county to designate BPPAs. They designated White Flint as the first in the state, and added over two dozen more as part of their Bus Rapid Transit plan. So far SHA has confirmed the White Flint BPPA, but not any of the others.

The original BPPA bill required SHA to write guidelines to be adopted as policy for these areas, which has still not happened 20 years later. SHA has commissioned draft guidelines, but they still have not been released or adopted. This year, I have introduced a bill to strengthen the BPPA effort by setting deadlines for SHA to adopt a policy regarding how BPPA's will be treated differently from other areas in the state, including design guidelines, and to confirm BPPA's that include state highways and have been designated by counties.





Global Nomads Group. For every bookmark they made and sent to Students Rebuild in Seattle, the Bezos Family Foundation will donate \$1 to Save the Children's Literacy Boost program. 

agrees. A graduate of the University of Maryland Medical School, he has served as the Medical Director of Riderwood since 2003.

"There are many easy steps that people of all ages can take to improve heart health," said Dr. Machado. He offered five proactive tips for achieving that goal.

- Stay active. After consulting a physician, join a fitness center or exercise with friends. A goal of at least 30 minutes of moderate physical activity each day, five times per week, can lower risk for heart disease, stroke & diabetes and even improve memory.
- Know and control your cholesterol. Cholesterol is a substance that is used by your body to make cell membranes and some hormones. But when you have too much cholesterol, it leads to plaque formation in your arteries, potentially causing blockages leading to heart disease.
- Eat a healthy diet. Concentrate on eating vegetables, fruit, fiber-rich whole grain products, & fish at least twice a week and cut back on sugars & saturated fats.
- Manage blood pressure. Know your numbers! Reducing sodium intake, maintaining physical activity and avoiding smoking help to keep blood pressure at an acceptable level.
- Lose weight. The more weight you carry, the greater the risk

for increased blood pressure, high blood cholesterol and diabetes. Even losing a few pounds can reduce an overweight person's risk for heart disease dramatically.


