Beltsville Blues: The Story of District VI

A great reference book was written in 1991 by Lt. Dennis Campbell entitled Journey Through Time: A Pictorial History of the Prince George's Police Department. If you like history and lots of pictures, a copy is available for reference at the Beltsville Library. (A circulation copy is no longer available at the Hyattsville Branch.)

To quote page 24 of the book: "A Maryland State Police Force was created in 1914 to enforce motor vehicle laws...under the control of the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles, ...patrolled the state highways on motorcycles... did not authorize its officers to make arrests." Numerous changes have occurred since then!

On April 6, 2017, the Prince George's County Police Department celebrated its 86th birthday as an independent department reporting directly to county officials. Our Beltsville station (District VI), a former public school located at 4321 Sellman Road, was established in the late 1970's. It shares the same building as the Beltsville Branch of the public

There have been many upgrades and technological advances at the Beltsville station throughout the years. In October 2013 at FedEx Field, newly designed gray and

dark blue cruisers were introduced. The vehicles have smaller engines and are more fuel efficient. It is projected that a 12.76 percent savings will occur on gas and oil alone this year. One part of the officers' operating the cars was going through training and passing an obstacle test without knocking down any cones in limited time.

Other advances include car cameras, car computers, the expansion of less nonlethal force tools/equipment, updated service training, specialty unit training, and SmartWater technology. SmartWater is an international crime and prevention company. The station always has future plans to keep up with modern times and assure that it is capable of properly serving the Laurel, Beltsville, Adelphi, and Calverton areas. There

While the size of the parking lots and building are limited to the base size of the building structure, there are satellite offices that are used on a regular basis to be in direct contact with the communi-

The department is not only the largest in the county but one of the largest in Maryland! Many officers are volunteers, and there are many father/son/daughter and brother/sister relationships in the department. The chief's father served in the department as well! Many departments require college credits and/or prior experience. The Prince George's County Police Department currently does

The Beltsville station always participates in the National Night Out every first Tuesday of August, and the department offers many proactive programs, such as:

- **Tuesday Tea Time with COPS.** Meets the second Tuesday of every month at the Riderwood facility in Calverton to review the latest and greatest crime trends and to conduct proactive educational crime prevention seminars.
- District VI Coffee. Meets the first Thursday of every month at the Laurel-Beltsville Senior Activity Center from 1-2 pm to educate our senior communities on the latest crime trends targeting our seniors and to have educational seminars and presentations from the police and fire departments.
- Explorers/Jr Investigators. Meet every Wednesday at our Calverton satellite office from 5–8 pm. This is a youth group that trains our youths, ages 10-21, on the everyday working of not only being a police officer but also being an outstanding citizen.
- Christmas in April. Works on a house or assists a family with necessary repairs the family is unable to complete. Applications are reviewed by a board and the Beltsville station. Necessary work is performed to make a house a home.
- Holiday food baskets. Identifies and distributes food to the neediest families in November and December. The station also assists a couple of families year-round.
- Neighborhood watch. Regular neighborhood watch trainings and refresher seminars conducted on a regular/as-needed basis. Operation identification and residential home security surveys go hand in hand with this.
- Others. The Need to Read, Safe Shoppers Seminar, PAL, Adult ID, Child ID, Head Start, VIPS program, child safety seat check, Judicial Watch, bullying/texting presentations, crime prevention seminars, and community walks.

Many thanks to senior officials and staff of Beltsville Police Station who made this article possible! In 2031 (just 14 years), many of the current police officers will be around to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the Prince George's County Police Department!

tive officer of the ship with all correspondence.

"My job has a lot of face time with the triads, so I get my work noticed often and am appreciated," said Ogunsola.

With the ability to conduct anti-air warfare, anti-submarine warfare, and anti-surface warfare, destroyers are capable of sustained maritime operations supporting forward naval presence, maritime security, sea control, deterrence of aggressive actions on U.S. partners around the globe, and humanitarian assistance. Fast, maneuverable, and technically advanced, destroyers provide credible combat power at and from the sea.

"Service at sea onboard a Navy

destroyer is an incredible experience," said Cmdr. Robert A. Heely Jr., commanding officer of USS Michael Murphy. "The extraordinary performance of Michael Murphy is made possible by the sailors that man her on a daily basis. Team Murphy is comprised of 350 talented sailors from across our country. They are all resilient and dedicated professionals who strive each and every day to uphold the strong legacy of our namesake, Lt. Michael P. Murphy. I'm proud of their teamwork and commitment to the mission."

The men and women serving aboard the ship have highly specialized jobs and keep each part of the destroyer running smoothly. They do everything from to maintaining gas turbine engines and operating the highly sophisticated Aegis Combat System to driving the ship and operating small boats.

"Since this is a small boat, I like that we get to go out to sea often and are able to enjoy port visits," said Ogunsola. "Of course, Lt. Murphy is our namesake, and that is pretty awesome."

Challenging living conditions build strong fellowship among the crew. The crew is motivated and can quickly adapt to changing conditions. It is a busy life of specialized work, watches, and drills. Serving aboard a guided missile destroyer instills accountability and toughness and fosters initiative and integrity.

"Serving in the Navy means adventure," added Ogunsola. "I get to go out and serve the country, meet new people and represent the United States.'

Talk to Your Device

In the original Star Trek TV series, the crew of the Star Ship Enterprise would simply say "Computer," and the ship's computer would respond in a computer voice with an answer to their questions. Fifty years later, voice response capability is nearly ubiquitous working with devices small enough to fit into our pockets. Today, you can talk with your phone, your TV remote, your computer, or though special devices like the Amazon Echo or Google Assistant.

In general, voice response comes in two flavors, text to speech and voice assistant. Text to speech has been available on computers since the 1980's with products like Dragon's Speaking Naturally product. Most recent Android phones provide the ability to use your voice instead of the keypad to enter text into messages and most other products. The voice recognition works with the keypad application so it works consistently with most Android applications that use the keyboard. Some early phones had a simple voice command capability that understood a few simple commands like dial home, but these could not handle continuous speech like modern phones.

Apple Siri

Apple kicked off the current age of voice assistants when it released Siri. Siri did many of the same things as was available in Google Voice Search but did it in a more conversational format. In addition to basic search functions, Siri could answer questions posed in normal conversational English, and Siri could tell jokes. To access Siri on a Siri-enabled device, you simply say "Siri" followed by what you want to ask Siri, and Siri will try to answer.

Google Now to Google Assist

When Siri was release, there were a lot of comparisons between Siri and Google Now, which followed Google Voice Search. Google added support for a number of Google app and phone commands. You could simply say "Ok Google, Navigate Home," and



the device would launch Google Maps and create a route to guide you back home. Google Now is being replaced by Google Assistant. Google Assistant is supposed to be more conversational than the "Now" version and is backed by an Artificial Intelligence (AI) engine. Google collects a lot of information about your online activities and tries to apply this knowledge to return the best answers that are relevant to you. Google now offers a voice appliance called the Google Assistant. This is basically a smart speaker with a builtin microphone. This concept was pioneered by Amazon.

Amazon Alexa

While Google knows what you are doing on the Internet, Amazon knows what you buy. Amazon created the Echo and gave the Echo the Alexa voice assistant. The Echo is basically a smart speaker with built-in microphones and no screen. With Alexa you can order things from Amazon, and they will be automatically sent to your home. This has had some interesting consequences with children ordering toys and demonstrations on TV causing many orders from Echo devices hearing and reacting to the TV orders.

viding voice capabilities on their phones, Microsoft needed to do so as well. With Windows 10, the Cortana voice assistant arrived on our laptops and desktops. If you have a microphone as most laptops do you can enable Cortana to respond to your voice by saying "Hey, Cortana." Cortana can search for applications and files on your PC, use Bing to search the web, and use Bing maps for navigation. It also integrates with several Microsoft apps available in the Windows app store.

Voice Translation

Many of the current voice assistants now have the ability to translate words spoken in one language to another language. Google has been doing this the longest with its translate application, but most of the others support this feature now. To do this on Google, simply say "OK Google, Translate 'Hello, how are you,' into Spanish," and Google will respond in voice "Hola, como estas."

How Do They Work

In general, the devices we are discussing are not powerful enough to accurately understand every word we say as continuous speech. So while we are talking, the device captures the sound and sends it over the Internet where more powerful computers translate the voice into something the machine understands. The trans-

lated speech may be sent to another server to do an Internet search for example, or it may be returned back to the device to drive a command on the device.

Does this mean the device is always listening and sending what it hears to the Internet? Isn't there a risk that they hear everything going on around them? For the devices discussed here, the answer is no. These devices use what are called "guard words." The device itself has the ability to understand a few phrases without needing to send out to the Internet. When you say "Ok, Google" or "Hello, Alexa," the device itself recognizes the phrase and sends what follows to the servers on the Internet to process. When the interaction is over, the device stops sending what it hears and only listens for the guard words.

That is not true for all devices. It was demonstrated a couple of years ago that certain Samsung and other voice command televisions were listening to everything going on in the household and sending the information to a third party for processing. Essentially these devices and companies had the ability to eavesdrop on everything going on in the home. It was revealed in the news a few weeks ago that our government was aware of these weaknesses and leveraged them as they felt was needed.

Enough for now: enjoy the heat and have a heart-to-heart conversation with your phone.






