Beware of Virtual Kidnapping Scams

It seems as if every time we turn on the news there is another scam being reported on. Someone is always out to get money from someone else. This has taken a scary turn for some people in our area.

I am a member of Nextdoor, a social media site where you can post different information about items in your neighborhood. Items can include lost pets, something that you are selling or giving away, community events and gettogethers, and many other things. As I was scrolling through one day, I came across a post called phone scam. Pam Lloyd from the South Laurel/Beltsville Region had posted a story about a call her 84-year-old mother received on her cell phone. On the other end, a young girl was "crying and screaming saying she was her granddaughter." The caller even knew the granddaughter's first name. She was asking for money before "a belligerent man then took the phone threatening very graphic threats to kill her granddaughter, saying that he had her in his van, and proceeded to berate her trying to get financial information." This phone call lasted over 30 minutes in which the woman attempted to explain that she didn't have a driver's license and

only had about \$500. The caller then demanded a family member's phone number, and the respondent gave her daughter's. When the caller phoned the daughter, Pam, they didn't get an answer. After about 30 minutes, they grew tired and gave up. The caller ID on the phone came across as "private caller."

After the "kidnappers" hung up the phone, the grandmother immediately called her daughter to check on her granddaughter. Everything turned out to be fine: the granddaughter was home at the time. After a little work with her mom's cell service, "Great Call," they were able to pinpoint that the call came from Mexico City. Pam reported the details and information to the local FBI and Federal Trade Commission.

According to many news reports and the FBI, this scam is not uncommon, and these people are using this scam to make thousands of dollars. The likelihood of them being caught is very low because the calls often come from blocked or private numbers. The best way to avoid them is to be alert. If you receive one of these calls, slow down the conversation and ask for more time, call or text the victim, and contact the police. An even better strategy is that if you don't recognize the number don't answer the phone.

Hearing loss affects almost 50 million Americans today. Although hearing problems are commonly associated with the normal aging process, more than half of all hearing-impaired people are younger than 65. You may have a problem with your hearing and need to see an audiologist if you have trouble hearing a conversation in a noisy environment such as a restaurant, are unable to hear people talk to you without looking at them, or have a constant ringing or pain in your ears.

The first step in treating a hearing problem is a hearing evaluation by an audiologist.

Audiologists have a variety of specialties that include, but are not limited to:

- · Performing hearing evaluations for all ages, including newborns and infants
- · Prescribing and fitting hearing
- Designing and implementing hearing conservation programs
- Providing hearing rehabilitation

Although most hearing loss is permanent, an audiologist can determine the best treatment, which may include hearing aids, assistive listening devices, and hearing rehabilitation. 

Stay **Private**

Earlier this month, the legislative branch of our government passed a law repealing FCC Internet privacy rules and allowing Internet service providers (ISPs) to collect and sell information about the Websites each of us visits. The President signed the bill immediately after it passed both houses. It seems that lawmakers figure there is no need to keep our browsing habits private even though we use the Internet to explore things like health issues, finances, and entertainment, all topics that have been deemed to be private matters in other federal laws and court findings:



This month's column is an effort to provide you with some tools to help protect your privacy.

HTTPS Everywhere

since releases via WikiLeaks and from Snowden made it obvious that people are watching our Internet activities, there has been a movement in Web communities to make sure all of our browsing within a site is secure. This movement is known as "HTTPS Everywhere." HTTPS is the secure protocol for browsing the Web (as opposed to HTTP). When you connect to a Website using HTTPS, all of the Web traffic between your browser and the site is encrypted. Your ISP knows what site you are accessing but can't see the individual pages or the content of the pages. So, for example, the ISO would know you went to WebMD but does not know you searched about Parkinson's disease. You can easily tell on most current browsers if you have a secure connection because a green lock will appear on the left of the address bar.

The Electronic Freedom Foundation (EFF) has even created a technology to make it easier for Website operators to receive and deploy the certificates required to make these secure connections. Cloudflare also provides a free, secure proxy that can provide some protection for sites that are unable to secure their pages through other means. Most secure sites will force you to a secure connection if you try to connect using HTTP. If they do not do



this, try to use HTTPS in front of the URL to see if you can connect

Virtual Private Networks

A virtual private network (VPN) sits between your browser and the rest of the Web. The VPN encrypts the connection between your computer and the Web. Your ISP only sees the connection to the VPN and is not able to see any of the sites that are visited or data exchanged. VPN technology is popular with travelers so they can browse safely in hotels and restaurants without anyone nearby being able to monitor what they are doing through the network. VPN services typically cost \$30 to \$60 per year. Not all VPN service providers are secure, so it is a good idea to research VPN providers before choosing one. This may be a topic for a future column.

Tor

Tor (The Onion Router) is a special service for those that need extreme privacy on the network. It was originally designed and created to provide a means of private communications for freedom fighters in countries where freedoms are limited. Unfortunately, it has also become a favorite choice of criminals. While it does allow private communication, it is probably overkill for basic Web browsing.

Private Searching

Your ISP sees all of your Internet traffic. Because most people do not have a choice of ISPs (we are a lucky community to have two providers), Internet users have no choice but to be exposed unless they take precautions like the ones we have discussed. However, it is easy to forget that search providers like Google and Bing see not just your searches but also the results that you click on. This is why ads about what you were searching follow you on the Internet. If you have sensitive topics you want to search (like a health issue for example), try using DuckDuckGo (https://duckduckgo.com). Duck-DuckGo does not track you and ensures privacy in your search.

Opt-out versus Opt-in

The current law as it is written allows a consumer to opt-out of information sharing instead of the more consumer-friendly practice requiring a customer to opt-in if they want their ISP to share their information with other companies. There are some issues with this. For example, Verizon for many years injected a special Verizon "super-cookie" into each HTTP message allowing customers to be tracked across multiple Websites. Verizon sold access to the customer's identity, but it normally isn't too difficult to uncover the identity without further Verizon help. Verizon did this without informing its customers and only provided an opt-out when the cookie behavior was disclosed through news outlets: http://www.theverge. com/2016/3/7/11173010/verizonsupercookie-fine-1-3-million-fcc.



Rosapepe's Report to Beltsville

Last month, Delegates Barbara Frush, Joseline Peña-Melnyk, Ben Barnes, and I concluded the 2017 legislative session. As you can imagine, much of our work this year has been focused on protecting Maryland from the dangers coming from the federal government. Among the most important:

- We set up the Maryland Health Insurance Coverage Protection Commission to monitor attacks on Obamacare, Medicare, and Medicaid and prepare state action to protect Maryland families.

- The budget also included state funds for Maryland Public Television if federal funds are cut.

All of us have been outraged by corruption at the Prince George's liquor board, revealed in recent indictments. To restore its integrity, we overhauled liquor regulation in Prince George's, tightening ethics rules and professionalizing the agency.





I have a GREAT recipe for you this month. The recipe is simple, and you have everything you need there in your pantry. Don't you hate recipes that call for a secret ingredient that makes you look all over the supermarket and when you can't find it you just abandon the project? This recipe is three fold, French toast, bread pudding and coconut custard pie.

First, make the egg filling (you

Calverton Elementary School Hosts ESOL Family Night

On Wednesday, February 23, Calverton Elementary School hosted ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) Night, an event designed to provide families with an overview of the ESOL program and the opportunity to learn of available resources in the Beltsville area. Two of the school's community partners were invited to share information about their organizations. The Prince George's Beltsville Branch Library and the Beltsville Adventist Community Center were there to inform families of the assistance and support services they provide.

Upon arrival, guests were offered snacks and beverages. Participants were then warmly welcomed by Principal Monique Sloan. She reminded parents of Calverton's open door policy and encouraged them to visit the school often. She went on to share that the school's mission at Calverton is that every student graduate career and college ready, regardless of individual differ-

ences. Portable listening devices were made available to assist non-English speaking families so that everyone could hear the information.

Next, the ESOL department chair introduced ESOL team members that work with the more than 350 English Language Learners at Calverton. The students are divided amongst seven ESOL teachers based on their grade and proficiency level. As part of the presentation, teachers modeled lessons that emphasize listening, speaking, reading, and writing strategies that students have been working on throughout the school year.

Prizes were raffled off throughout the evening to keep the students engaged. The winners received backpacks, books, school supplies, and t-shirts. Students whose ticket numbers were called were ecstatic!

A representative from the Prince George's County Beltsville Branch Library system spoke to parents about services to students. These services included homework help, which is available both in person and online in English

and several other languages. A language software program is also available for all Prince George's County students. In order to access these and the many other services, students simply need to present a library card. Families were encouraged to stop by the library to sign up for a library card and to learn about the other services it provides.

Speakers from the Beltsville Adventist Community Center also in attended. They discussed their mission to assist families with personal needs. The community center provides job counseling, food resources, and other emergency assistance on a case-by-case basis. After the presentation, guests were invited to pick up brochures and handouts for services that interested them. With more than 100 people in attendance, the night was a huge success!

After all was said and done, the message remained clear: the Calverton Elementary School staff values partnerships with all families and believes that a strong home-school connection is crucial to the success of every child.

at Heart and other senior groups, Tom was the leading force in getting the Laurel-Beltsville Senior Activity Center built next to the hospital. He also shepherded the construction of Vansville Elementary School through the school construction budget process and convinced the Board of Education to build it as an LEED certified "green school." And, when the board declared that the school would not have a gym, he worked with the council to get Vansville to be a "park school" with a MNCPPC gymnasium/community center. He also got funding to benefit Martin Luther King, Jr., Middle School; Beltsville Academy; James E. Duckworth Regional Learning Center; and Frances Fuchs Early Childhood Center.

For years, High Point High School (HPHS) had been neglected with an unusable track and a seriously leaking roof (which damaged many things, especially the auditorium). Tom got the auditorium repaired and renovated and battled Superintendent Andre Hornsby over the roof and track. After a lot of work, Tom got a \$3.5 million new roof and raised hundreds of thousands of dollars from Beltsville residents and county businesses to build a new track. Tom also worked with HPHS students on multiple projects: attending a climate change rally in Annapolis, testifying before the Board of Education for better school media centers, testifying before the County Council for afterschool transportation funding, lobbying state legislators to get an HPHS student appointed to the State Board of Education, and more.

If elected to the council again, Tom has promised to make his top priority be the complete rebuilding of High Point High School. As Beltsville residents that were very involved in our local schools at the time, we worked with him firsthand and found that he was approachable, listened to his constituents, shot straight, and worked hard. Tom was a hands-on leader focused on solving problems. What more can we ask for?




